All FIP applicants and participants must cooperate with PROMISE JOBS unless exempt. The PROMISE JOBS program provides work and training services for FIP participants to meet federal requirements and to help participants become selfsupporting.

Almost all of the adults in a FIP household are required to participate in PROMISE JOBS. Those who are not required to participate include:

- ▶ Children under 16 who are not parents
- ► Children age 16-18 who are in school
- ▶ Persons receiving SSI
- ► Caretaker relatives who do not receive FIP

Federal Flexibility

FIP Eligibility
Determinations: There are no federal requirements or prohibitions regarding how frequently states do eligibility determinations for programs funded with TANF, including FIP. There would be a fiscal impact related to completing more frequent eligibility determinations (printing, postage, increase in workload). This change would require rule changes, system changes, manual changes, form changes and training. Please note that if a policy change causes the FIP caseload to decrease the decrease in cases related to the policy change cannot be counted in the caseload reduction credit that helps the state meet federal TANF work rate requirements.



Federal TANF statute and regulations would allow changes to the FIP work requirements, but only to the extent that the program continues to meet TANF work requirements as specified in federal law, Title IV of the Social Security Act. There are no waiver provisions in federal law for TANF. Any changes would require rule changes, system changes, manual changes, form changes and training, along with potential updates to Iowa code, our TANF State Plan, TANF Work Verification Plan, and contract with Iowa Workforce Development (for PROMISE JOBS services).
