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

MHDS Regions







MHDS Regions - History

- 2012 Legislation passed to form MHDS Regional system with goals of improving equal access to services and supports for Iowans
- **2014** Regions are effective 7/1/2014
- > 2015 \$30M for funding equalization
- 2017 Complex Service Needs legislation
- ▶ 2019 Children's Services legislation (effective 7/1/2021)
- 2021 SF 619 begins to shift funds away from property tax levy to State appropriation

MHDS Regions Implementation of SF619

Establish MHDS Regional Services Fund

- Phase in over two years
- Ends county property tax levy
- Ongoing funding 100% state appropriation

Performance Based Contracts

- ▶ Initial contract timeline: January 1, 2022 June 30, 2023
- Initial contracts outline existing statutory requirements
 - Core services
 - Submission of annual service and budget plan
 - Submission of utilization data
 - Annual reporting
- Active participation in joint-led DHS and MHDS Regional system building and integration



MHDS Regions – Future State

Strengthened partnerships between State and Local level

- Historic State investment to ensure funding is sustainable and predictable
- Utilize local connections to Regions for real time on the ground insight and monitoring

Improved accountability and transparency

Performance-based contracts for each of the MHDS Regions

Clearly defined roles and responsibilities

- Data and systems working together to be prepared for the future
- DHS and stakeholder workgroups have made previous recommendations that may be worth revisiting
- Continue to build a pathway toward equitable services for lowans



MHDS Regions Crisis Services

Mobile Response

- On-site, face-to-face mental health crisis services for individuals experiencing a mental health crisis
- Adults and Children

23-hour Crisis Observation

- Services up to 23 hours in a medically staffed treatment environment
- Adults

Crisis Stabilization Community Based

- Services to de-escalate a crisis and stabilize an individual; provided where the individual lives or works.
- Adults and Children



MHDS Regions Crisis Services

Crisis Stabilization Residential Based

- Services to de-escalate a crisis and stabilize an individual; provided in a residential setting
- Adults and Children

Access Centers

- Coordinated services providing assessment and screening for multioccurring conditions, care coordination, crisis stabilization residential services, subacute mental health services, and substance use disorder treatment for individuals experiencing a mental health or substance use crisis

Where it Began – The Why



Population Estimates (18 and older)

Mental Health

- 19% (18 and older) Any mental illness in the past year
- 8.7% experience a major depressive episode in the past year
- ▶ 5.4% had serious thoughts of suicide
- 53.6% with any mental illness that received care
- Suicide Rate (2020) approximately 18 per 100K lowans
- Death by Suicide (CY 2020) provisional: 592

Overlap in substance abuse + mental health

50% who experience mental illness also experience problems with substance use.

Provide information on specific addiction and mental health issues - both prevention and treatment focus. MOTIVATION


Inspire action to seek specific information and/or help for self or other.

National Suicide Hotline Designation Act of 2020

Lifeline Network Crisis Centers in lowa

There are currently 2 crisis centers in lowa that answer the National Suicide Prevention Lifeline:





988 Planning in Iowa

- In January 2020 IDPH, in collaboration with DHS, received a 988 state implementation planning grant from Vibrant Emotional Health to support the lowa implementation of 988
- DHS received a Transformation Transfer Initiative (TTI) grant to develop two standardized training toolkits specific to serving children and LGBTQ+ individuals to be accessed by lowa's 988 and crisis behavioral health workforce
- DHS plans to submit an application for the SAMHSA Cooperative Agreement for States and Territories to Build Local 988 Capacity funding opportunity which is due January 31, 2022



National Guidelines for Behavioral Health Crisis Care

- In order to ensure that all lowans have access to quality crisis care, the system of care needs to have:
 - Someone to Talk To
 - Someone to Respond
 - A Place to Go
- 988 is an important component of an integrated and coordinated continuum of care for individuals in crisis.



Ongoing Considerations for 988

- Crisis center capacity to respond
- Sustainable funding
- Seamless service coordination with other crisis services (911, mobile crisis response, crisis stabilization, access centers, emergency departments, etc...)
- Technology needed to coordinate care





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
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

Appendix | 23-Hour Crisis Observation






