Long-Term Care

- We are facing a long-term care crisis in lowa.
- 27 lowa nursing homes have closed over the past two years (2021-2023).
- Nearly 42% of lowa's nursing homes have self-reported staffing shortages over the past year.
- Average hourly rate for direct care workers = approximately \$16/hour

What is the Scorecard?

The Long-Term Services and Supports State (LTSS) Scorecard is a tool that measures long-term services and supports system performance at the state level. State and federal policy makers, providers, advocates and other stakeholders can use the Scorecard to assess areas of strength and identify opportunities for improvement within their respective state's LTSS system. The Scorecard scores states across five dimensions of LTSS, comprised of 50 indicators. State performance across overall LTSS and within the five dimensions is ranked and organized into tiers, from better to worse performing, 1-5 from top to bottom. 
AARP Long-Term Care in Iowa

- <u>lowa ranks 38th</u> in <u>Medicaid spending on home-based care</u> (27.6%), meaning a significant majority of state Medicaid dollars are being allocated to institutions, rather than improving an already lacking home and community-based services network.
- lowa ranks 46th in terms of affordability of home-based care.
- lowa ranks in the <u>bottom half of states providing adequate Adult Day Services</u>, a care option that offers greater flexibility for individuals who don't need institutional care full-time but could still benefit from additional support.
- Access to <u>Green House style homes is limited.</u>
- lowa has significantly <u>more nursing home residents with "low care needs"</u> than most states across the country.



Long-Term Care

- Areas where changes can be made at the state level include:
 - Rebalancing Medicaid spending on home and community-based services so it is equal to institutional care;
 - Incentivizing small-model nursing homes that focus on person-centered care and have lower staff turnover;
 - Improving access to respite care and adult day services;
 - and Improving transparency of taxpayer spending on nursing homes.

- Legislative Study
 Committee
 - conduct a comprehensive review of lowa's long-term care health system and prepare a report with bipartisan recommendations with specific focus on workforce, innovative models of care, and financial transparency.
