The Developmental Disability (DD) Assistance and Bill of Rights Act


The DD Act of 2000 Public Law 106-402 established a set of programs to improve the lives of people with developmental disabilities through capacity building and systems change, advocacy and the enforcement and protection of civil rights

These programs are the state DD Councils, Disability Rights Centers (Disability Rights Iowa), and the University Centers for Excellence in Developmental Disabilities (Center for Disabilities and Development).

These are sometimes called the DD Network.







The Developmental Disability (DD) Assistance and Bill of Rights Act

Congress finds that disability is a **natural part** of the human experience that does not diminish the right of individuals with disabilities to:

- Live independently
- Have control and choice over their own lives
- Fully participate in and contribute to their communities



Who are we?

The Iowa DD Council is a group of volunteers dedicated to creating change.

- 24 members appointed by the governor
- 60% people with disabilities or family members
- People who work for the state government
 - DRI, CDD, Dept. Education, Dept. Aging, Child Health
 Specialists Clinics, VR, IME, County/local reps, Providers








Aaron's Story


