The PHE unwind plan continues this quarter. This largely contributes to the elevated numbers of discontinuances and the large fluctuations in renewals.

Iowa onboarded a new Managed Care Organization (MCO) in the 3rd quarter. Effective 07/01/2023, Molina Healthcare of Iowa (MOL) now has joined Iowa Medicaid. Molina joins Iowa's existing MCOs, Iowa Total Care (ITC), and Amerigroup (AGP). Adding Molina has increased both the provider network, as well as the number of active providers this quarter.

The Public Policy Center of Iowa (PPC) spent the quarter on several projects. They began planning for events set to be implemented in 2024. These include a DWP member survey, a Member Experiences survey, and member interviews for the Healthy Behaviors program. They continued work on a Non-Emergency Medical Transportation (NEMT) report. Lastly, PPC focused on development of the interim report due at the end of the year.

The average number of new enrollees per month over the prior quarter was 1,978, increasing 6% from the prior quarter. With the PHE unwind in full effect this quarter, we are seeing a decrease in the total number of members enrolled in the IWP. Although the numbers show children under 19 enrolled in the IWP, these numbers are due to technical errors due to overrides in the eligibility system due to the PHE and are being addressed to correct the issue.
