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Statewide Access and Provider Capacity Assessment Survey



Goals

- Investigate the community-based service (CBS) needs of three populations of concern and provider capacity to serve them in the least restrictive setting
- 1. Individuals with intellectual and developmental disabilities (IDD)
- 2. Children and youth with serious emotional disturbance (SED)
- 3. School-based services users



Provider survey

Waiver Submission 101



What is Medicaid?

- Medicaid is a program run by state governments within federal guidelines
- It provides health care coverage for lowincome adults, children, individuals with disabilities and pregnant women
- It is the largest payer of mental health services, long-term services and supports and births

Federal Approval of State Programs

A state must submit documents to the Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services for approval in order to operate programs.

In Iowa, these documents include:

- State Plan Amendments (SPAs) Documents that describe the Medicaid program administration, eligibility categories and non-waiver services provided
- 1915(i) State Plan Option A document that describes Home and Community Based Service benefits under the state plan for a targeted population
- 1915(c) Waivers Documents that describe how a state will meet the needs of people who prefer supports in the community rather than an institutional setting
- 1115 Demonstrations A document, approved by the Secretary of Health and Human Services, that waives certain provisions of Medicaid law
- 1915(b) Waivers A document that describes the modification of a typical fee-for-service delivery system (these are typically to get authority to operate managed care programs)

Current HCBS System CHALLENGES RECOMENDATIONS

Waitlists are not timely, efficient or needs-based

• Develop a single waitlist that allows Iowa HHS to understand needs and prioritize waiver slots

Services do not align with lowan's needs

- Transition to a waiver system that is need-based, person-centered and equitable
- Expand service offerings to address the whole person
- Use tiered budget levels to more efficiently use limited funds

Services and supports are difficult to navigate and access

- Develop a system that is easier to understand and navigate
- Use blended provider networks to maximize capacity

Proposed Waiver Redesign

Supporting families, serving individuals across the lifespan, and serving individuals in the living situation that works best for them and their families.



Change from 7 waivers to 2, age-based waivers

Waiver 1: Children and Youth (ages 0 to 20) Waiver 2: Adult and Aging (ages 21 and older)



Offer comprehensive service packages

Include formal and informal supports that meet the needs of lowans across their lifespan



Develop "tiered" budgets

Allocate resources for eligible individuals based on their needs

Waitlist Management

 Some people apply for multiple waivers and stay on the waitlists for long periods without receiving adequate services to meet their needs 	 An assessment and prioritization system would ensure those with the highest needs can access services in a timely fashion People with lower assessed needs may be placed on a waitlist, and receive navigation services to connect them with services and supports during this time

3. Develop "tiered" budgets

- A universal assessment would assess every individual's needs and result in a level of need score.
- The score, plus other factors such as age or living arrangements, would set the monthly budget for waiver services.
- The approach would ensure lowans receive services they need in an efficient and costeffective way.

Funding Community Based Services



Funding for Community Based Services

House File 2698 appropriates funds to support:

- ✓ \$14.6 million for HCBS provider reimbursement rates
- ✓ \$1.9 million for 76 additional waiver slots for lowans with intellectual disabilities
- ✓ \$2.3 million for mental health provider reimbursement rates
- ✓ \$3 million for adjustments toward home health provider rates working with older lowans
- ✓ \$5.0 million for case management to coordinate care for vulnerable populations

Initial Feedback on Concept Paper



Engagement and feedback activities

- Shared concept paper with CMS and the public on April18
 - 104 responses received via the online feedback form as of May 8
 - 285 providers attended the listening session on May 7
 - 109 total members attended listening sessions on May 6 and May 9

- Steering committee meetings on March 26 and May 1
 - Introduced the concept paper and promoted the upcoming feedback opportunity



Preliminary themes from feedback

- Positive reactions to the proposed two waiver structure, emphasizing increased efficiencies and reduced administrative burden.
- Ongoing concerns about meeting the elderly population needs, and transitions from the child/youth to adult/aging waiver.
- Support for increased accessibility to services that were not previously available due to waiver restrictions.
