





Approach #2 – Community Survey Respondents

N = 474 responses

Gender:

- 69% Female,
- 25% Male,
- 6% prefer not to answer.

- 35-54 yrs. 22%
- 55-64 yrs. 20%

- Prefer not to answer 8% (36 people)

Approach #2 – Community Survey Respondents

N = 474 responses

Characteristics of Respondents:

- Living in Urban counties 64%
- An adult 60+ 61%
- Living with a chronic health condition 32%
- Person with a physical disability 17%
- Person with a mental health condition (mental health, substance use disorder, alcohol use disorder) – 11%
- A veteran 7%
- Person with an intellectual disability 3%

Characteristics of Living Situation:

- Living with an adult aged 60+ yrs. 38%
- Living alone 30%
- Living with an adult aged 18 59 yrs. 29%
- Living with children under 18 11%


Characteristics of Unpaid Caregivers:

- Unpaid caregiver 37%
 - Person with chronic health condition 88%
 - An adult aged 60+ yrs. 69%
 - Person in long-term care facility 13%
 - Children with disabilities 9%
 - Adults with disabilities (18+) 8%
















Content Preliminary Recommendations

Access to HCBS

 Access to services that allow people to stay in their homes or community settings for as long as possible.

Informal caregiver support

 Connecting to information and resources to help with mental, physical, and financial stressors of informal caregiving.

Direct care professionals

 Concerns about DCP workforce shortage and low pay/benefits.

Coordination of services and personcentered services

 Removing barriers to navigating system of services. Also includes training, education, and opportunities for incorporating person-centered strategies into service delivery.

Content Preliminary Recommendations

Health equity

 Includes concerns about language competency, understanding and respecting cultural values, and access to health care for underserved populations.

Paying for services

 Paying for doctors, dentists, mental health care, and other medical services, prescriptions, long-term care, and some medical bills.

Transportation & Vehicle Modifications

 Availability of community transportation options in rural areas, safe driving and stopping driving, making vehicle modifications to support drivers and passengers with disabilities, transportation to healthcare appointments, and community events or social engagements.

Process Recommendations

- Review and refine proposed steering committee recommendations.
- Assess recommendations for feasibility.
- Ensure SMART (Specific, Measurable, Achievable, Relevant, and Time-Bound) goals.
- Crosswalk the steering committee recommendations with current assessments and programs offered by state agencies and local partnerships to prevent duplication of work currently underway.
- Reconstitute focus groups at least annually to maintain relationships, build trust, and ensure their interests continue to be included.
- Regularly assess MPA activities and documents for whether disability could or should be more salient to ensure the MPA, as a multi-sector plan, fully includes the disability sector.
