We also help people with disabilities be their own ADVOCATE!


The Developmental Disability (DD) Assistance and Bill of Rights Act

The DD Act of 2000 Public Law 106-402 established a set of programs to improve the lives of people with developmental disabilities through **capacity building** and **systems change**, **advocacy** and the enforcement and protection of civil rights


These programs are the state DD Councils, Disability Rights Centers (Disability Rights Iowa), and the University Centers for Excellence in Developmental Disabilities (Center for Disabilities and Development).

These are sometimes called the DD Network.





The Developmental Disability (DD) Assistance and Bill of Rights Act



Congress finds that disability is a **natural part** of the human experience that does not diminish the right of individuals with disabilities to:

- ➤ Live independently
- ➤ Have control and choice over their own lives
- Fully participate in and contribute to their communities

Who are we?

The Iowa DD Council is a group of volunteers dedicated to creating change.

- 24 members appointed by the governor
- 60% people with disabilities or family members
- People who work for the state government
 - Disability Rights Iowa, Center for Disabilities and Development, Dept.
 Education, Health and Human Services Aging Bureau, Child Health
 Specialists Clinics, Vocational Rehabilitation, Medicaid County/local reps, Providers



BILL OF THE WEEK HSB 198/SF 2045: **Work Without** Worry

Changes Medicaid asset and income limits to allow employed individuals with disabilities to work more hours or earn more income while keeping their Medicaid



Assigned to Committee: House and Senare Health and Human Services Committees

Recent Actions:

- Introduced in Senate on January 16, 2024.
- Introduced in House on February 22, 2023.
- · Passed a House subcommittee on January 30, 2024.

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IMPACT ON IOWANS

The health insurance and services many lowans with disabilities get through Medicaid allows them to work. If they work too many hours or are paid too much for that work, they lose this insurance and support. This bill increases how much money a nerson can earn and save. More lowans with disabilities can work and live independently in the community.

QUICK FACTS


- . This bill ensures that most work earnings do not disqualify employed individuals with disabilities from Medicaid.
- This bill increases the income limit to 450% of the Federal Poverty Level, counts only the income of the individual (not household income), and removes the asset limit.
- · This allows employed individuals to save money, own a home, get married, and have reliable care without losing Medicaid
- . The unemployment rate for lowans with disabilities in 2021 was 8.9% compared to 3.6% for those without disabilities.
- This bill aligns with the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) goals by fostering independence and self-sufficiency for individuals with disabilities.

Bill Creator REP. JOSH TUREK



Josh Turek represents Iowa's 20th district in the House of Representatives. As a Paralympic athlete, he won gold in 2016 and 2020, bronze in 2012. Turek was born with spina bifida. He is an advocate for disabled individuals and is the first permanently disabled member of the lowa State Legislature.
