### **REACH Definition**

Iowa REACH is a new program from Iowa Medicaid.

It helps kids and teens in Iowa who have serious emotional or mental health challenges. The program gives them strong support at home and in their communities.

## How are we providing support?

- Recommend a uniform assessment tool and care plan to make sure everyone gets the services they need.
- Create a strong in-home and community-based care system, with better service coordination.
- Make sure services stay high-quality by building a plan to regularly review and improve them.

**Goal:** Making sure people don't fall through the cracks when trying to get support.



# Communications Objectives

- Engage and communicate with families to inform, educate, and involve youth and their families, providers and child serving agencies in the Iowa REACH Initiative.
- Develop accessible information and the plan to provide relevant services within the Iowa REACH continuum of care for youth, providers, and child-serving agencies.
- Other REACH subcommittees are still meeting currently.

# Outreach Strategies

- Deliver presentations to statewide advocacy groups across lowa, focusing on key areas such as:

- Conduct presentations and Q&A sessions with internal lowa HHS groups to ensure alignment and understanding across departments.

Group Name	Description
Youth Justice Council	Statewide group of youth and young adults with lived experience in the juvenile justice system (detention centers, State Training School, group homes, probation, court, etc)
Juvenile Justice Advisory Council	Multi-disciplinary state council of adults and youth who advise Iowa's juvenile justice system
ISTEP	Youth movement to prevent tobacco use. Statewide chapters
Mayor Youth Councils	Extensions of local city council's comprised of youth leaders from that community. Several of these groups have youth mental health prioritized.
Too Good to Lose Girls Court	Specialty court for girls in the juvenile justice system
Juvenile Drug Court	Specialty court for youth struggling with substance use in Polk County
iJAG	Statewide initiative to support youth to achieve jobs. Several school chapters and a statewide council. They've been great partners with me.

Group Name	Description
Early Intervention and Support	Supportive resource center for families (Iowa Support Network, Early Childhood Iowa, etc.)
Child Protective Services - Service Area Managers (SAMs) and Social Work Administrators (SWAs)	Aims to ensure children across Iowa are safe and families have supports.
State of Iowa Youth Advisory Council (SIYAC)	Youth advisory group selected to represent all Iowa youth and engage in topics important to young lowans.
	Concerns are drafted and shared with policy makers during the legislative session.

Quarterly Implementation Updates Building a System of Care for Children with Complex Behavioral Health Needs



Pathways to Success is a program for Medicaid enrolled children under the age of 21 in Illinois who have complex behavioral health needs and could benefit from additional support. The program provides access to an evidence-informed model of intensive care coordination and additional home and community-based services. A Behavioral Health Decision Support Model is used to help identify youth who might benefit from the Pathways to Success program. ### Specialized Managed Care Plan

Aetna Better Health of Ohio serves as the single statewide specialized managed care plan.



#### **Shared Governance**

OhioRISE features multi-agency governance to drive toward improving crosssystem outcomes - we all serve many of the same children, youth, and families.



### **Coordinated and Integrated Care & Services**

OhioRISE brings together local entities, schools, providers, health plans, and families as part of our approach for improving care for enrolled children and youth.



### **Prevent Custody Relinquishment**

OhioRISE's 1915(c) waiver targets the most in need and vulnerable families and children to prevent custody relinquishment.

### **OhioRISE Eligibility**

Children and youth who may be eligible for OhioRISE:

- Are eligible for Ohio Medicaid (either managed care or fee for service),
- Are age 0-20, and
- Require significant behavioral health treatment needs, measured using the Ohio Child and Adolescent Needs and Strengths (CANS) assessment or a recent inpatient behavioral health hospital/psychiatric residential treatment facility admission.


#### OhioRISE Services

- All existing behavioral health services with a few limited exceptions (behavioral health emergency dept.)
- ✓ Intensive and Moderate Care Coordination NEW
- Intensive Home-Based Treatment (IHBT) ENHANCED
- ✓ Psychiatric Residential Treatment Facilities (PRTF) NEW
- Behavioral health respite ENHANCED
- ✓ Flex funds to support implementing a care plan NEW.
- √ 1915(c) waiver that runs through OhioRISE NEW
  - · Unique waiver services & eligibility
- ✓ Mobile Response and Stabilization Service (MRSS) NEW
  - Also covered outside of OhioRISE (managed care or fee for service)
