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HHS Council Weatherization Assistance Program

- The Weatherization Assistance Program (WAP) is a low-income energy efficiency program administered by the U.S. Department of Energy.
- The purpose is to make the homes of low-income households more energy efficient, thereby reducing the households' energy bills.
- Energy efficiency measures may include:
 - sealing air leaks
 - insulating walls and attics
 - repairing or replacing heating units and water heaters




Weatherization Assistance Program

- The program also improves the health and safety of the homes by:
 - testing for gas leaks
 - installing exhaust fans to improve indoor air quality
 - installing smoke detectors and carbon monoxide alarms
 - addressing mold and moisture issues
 - testing for lead-based paint
- DOE administers the program to all 50 states, tribes and territories
- Iowa's program begins July 1st




Iowa Weatherization

- Agencies providing weatherization services are 15 community action agencies and one local government (Polk County)
- Energy Auditor visits the home, collects data, enters data into a modeling software, cost-effective measures are determined, work is completed and inspected by a Quality Control Inspector
- Agencies submit monthly reports to WAP office

Statewide program serving families and individuals in all 99 counties

1 local government



State Plan

- Each year a state plan that explains how the funds will be administered is submitted to DOE for approval
- Prior to submission, the draft plan is posted for public review and comment
- A public hearing is held to receive verbal comments, written comments may be sent in as well
- Comments are reviewed by the WAP office and the plan is revised as appropriate
- Comments and changes are reviewed and approved by the Policy Advisory Council
- The final plan is submitted by the WAP office to DOE for approval



Policy Advisory Council (PAC) Duties

- 1. SF 2385 (90th Gen. Assembly) eliminated the Commission on Community Action Agencies (formerly part of Human Rights)
- 2. Federal law 10 CFR § 440.17 requires states to have a PAC to approve the annual State Plan prior to submitting to US Dept. of Energy
- 3. Ad-hoc PAC has already been established
 - Low-income member of community (Stephanie Stebens/Davenport, lowa)
 - Division Director of Aging and Disability Services or their designee (Kyra Hawley/designee)
 - Executive Director of Iowa Community Action Association (Katherine Harrington)
 - Ex-Officio* (Wendy Mueller, Director of West Central Community Action)
 - Ex-Officio* (Sheri Wilson, Director of Community Action of Southeast lowa)



PAC Duties Cont.

1. New duties include:

- Advise the department with respect to the development and implementation of a weatherization assistance program.
- Recommend policies and measures with sensitivity towards solving the problems of low-income persons, including the weatherization and energy conservation problems of these persons.
- Serve as an effective and visible advocate by recommending policies which affect low-income persons, particularly elderly and handicapped low-income persons and low-income Native Americans.
