How to Handle Suspicious Mail (Letters and Packages)

Characteristics of suspicious mail include:

- Powdery substance on the outside.
- Unexpected or from someone unfamiliar.
- Excessive postage stamps in lieu of a meter strip.
- Handwritten or poorly typed address, incorrect titles or titles with no name, misspellings of common words or addressed to someone no longer with your organization or are otherwise outdated.
- Oily stains, discoloration, or odor.
- No return address, or has one that cannot be verified as legitimate.
- Excessive or unusual weight, given the size. Lopsided or oddly shaped.
- Protruding wires or aluminum foil.
- Excessive security materials (e.g. masking tape, string).
- Ticking sound.
- Marked with restrictive endorsements (e.g. "Personal" or "Confidential").
- Postmark with city/state not matching return address.

If you receive packages or envelopes that meet several of the above criteria, contact:

If letter or package is open and/or a threat is identified:

- Do not shake or empty the contents. HANDLE WITH CARE!
- Place the envelope or container in a plastic bag or cover and do not remove this cover. If powder is present, do not try to clean it up.
- Turn off fans or ventilation units in the area.
- Evacuate the room and close the door.
- Wash hands, arms, and other exposed surfaces with soap and water. Do not use bleach or other disinfectant on your skin.
- Contact the local police department immediately.
- Notify your supervisor and building security official immediately.
- Remove contaminated clothing as soon as possible and place in a plastic bag. Give clothing bag to the emergency responders for proper handling.
- Shower with soap and water as soon as possible.
- List all people present in the room or area when the letter or package was discovered. Give this list to local public health authorities for medical follow-up and to local law enforcement officials for further investigation.
