Overview Children do best in families!

Family First restructures how the federal government spends money on child welfare to improve outcomes for children:

- Prevent the need for removal through evidence-based family preservation services
- If removal is necessary, placement in this order:
 - Relative or fictive kin
 - Licensed Foster Family
 - Institutional care (for treatment only)
- All possible strategies for keeping children with their families, or in family settings, must be explored.



Placement Options in Child Welfare

Residential Care

Licensed Foster Home

Fictive Kin

(stable connection, not related by blood)

Extended Family to who child is related

Parents whenever safely possible



Demonstrated Success

- Iowa was the 11th state with an approved Family First Prevention Plan.
- Over the past 5 years, Iowa has reduced the number of youth in group care by 48%.
- 55% of all children and youth in foster care are living with relatives or fictive kin.
- 20% reduction on the number of children and youth entering foster care.
- Iowa is receiving more federal money than any other state to support high quality legal representation for parents.

Family First: Maintaining Momentum

Key Opportunities:

- Evaluate existing pilot programs
- Invest in Primary Prevention
- JCS establish post-discharge services for QRTP
- Modifications to Iowa Code Chapter 232



Family First: Maintaining Momentum

Modifications to 232

Technical Concerns

- Reasonable Efforts should be its own section (232.102A)
- Change to how summons/notices are provided (232.37)
- Add standards for when a guardian is removed (232.118)

Family First Aligned

- Require court to secure the least restrictive care for placement (232.1)
- Definition of "foster care" to include unlicensed relative and fictive kin (232.2(6))
- Defines "Fictive Kin" and "Relative" (232.2(20A) and 232.2(46A))
- Require the court to explicitly weigh the harm of removal with the harm avoided by removing the child **(232.67)**
- Sequence ordering of placement. Relatives are given preferred placement (232.78(8))
- Require reasonable efforts to place a child with siblings 232.108(1)
- Allow for Relative Notices even when custody is not with DHS (232.84(2))



Family First: Maintaining Momentum

Modifications to 232

Other Substantive Changes

- Shelter rate increase is limited by existing Code language
- Clarify responsibilities of Guardian ad Litems who are tasked with representing the interests of children in care
- Remove written requirement for mandatory reporters
- Allow multidisciplinary teams for ongoing services beyond the assessment phase
- Include the reportable child abuse incident to have occurred within the previous 5 years for allegations of Denial of Critical Care and Dangerous Substance (232.68), but continue to accept allegations from all other categories of abuse (sexual abuse, physical abuse, human trafficking, etc.)
- Align responsibility for Graduated Sanctions and Juvenile Detention Home Fund to the Director of Juvenile Court Services and CJJP due to both serving solely adjudicated delinquent youth.



Family First: Maintaining Momentum

Modifications to 234 and 600

Substantive Changes

- Extends Foster Care to the age of 21 years old, as long as the youth is engaged in case planning, wants to remain in foster care and is limited to licensed family foster care or supervised apartment living. (234.1)
- Reduce barriers to accessing information about siblings and other records to adult adoptees when a parent's rights are terminated pursuant to Chapter 232. (600.816A)
