In Iowa, Local Public Health Agencies (LPHA) are vital for ensuring the health and safety of communities in all 99 counties.

Local Boards of Health assure that a Community Health Assessment is completed and determines the unique needs of their community.

The framework for Essential Public Health Services, centered around health equity, is used to protect and promote the health of all people in all communities. Investigation of public health diseases, health education, environmental health services, emergency and disaster preparation and partnership building are just a few examples of services provided to the community.

Local Boards of Health decide if public health services will be offered by county employees or if they will contract with other health organizations to provide services on their behalf.
