Title:	COVID-19 support to Residential Settings (QRTP and Shelter)

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Background Information:	<ul> <li>Department of Human Services (DHS) has provided support to residential providers to assist with the increased costs and needs associated with the public health emergency:         <ul> <li>Provided PPE for contracted residential providers and detention centers, including hand sanitizer and face masks.</li> <li>Additional funding to directly purchase face coverings</li> <li>Written guidance documents developed in direct consultation with IDPH, which are posted to the COVID-19 section of the DHS website</li> <li>Waived non-safety related requirements to assist with staffing levels</li> <li>Daily correspondence as individual point of contact with all residential providers regarding testing, mitigation protocols, and communication with field</li> <li>Additional funding of \$12.50/day per guaranteed contracted bed to assist with staffing costs due to youth shifting to virtual school (April – May 2020).</li> <li>Additional funding of \$40.00/day per child to assist with staffing costs due to youth attending virtual school and home visits being disrupted (September 1, 2020-January 22, 2021).</li> </ul> </li> <li>Stakeholder Engagement: Residential providers have remained in close contact with DHS regarding the significant impact that COVID-19 has had on staffing levels, as youth remain on campus due to school closures, virtual learning, and reduced home visits. Positive COVID-19 cases in both youth and staff have affected most residential</li> </ul>



	providers. Feedback from residential providers have directly influenced the additional daily rate increase and the provision of PPE.
	<b>Reason for the Change:</b> In an effort to ease the financial burden placed on the residential providers, DHS was able to distribute additional PPE and supplemental funding to offset staffing costs.
	What Is Changing: DHS continues to prioritize support for our residential providers during the pandemic.
What Is Changing:	Who Is Impacted: DHS, JCS, QRTP and Shelter Care Providers, Juvenile Justice partners
	All QRTP and Shelter Care providers in Iowa continue to operate and accept and serve youth as required by contract.
What Is Not Changing:	
	Financial and other support is expected to allow residential settings, which have been severely impacted by COVID-19, to continue to operate and manage DHS/JCS referred youth as set forth in their contract.
