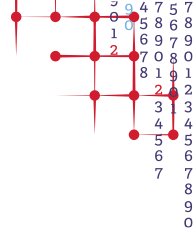

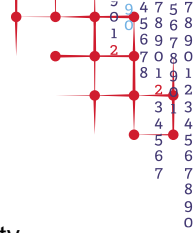

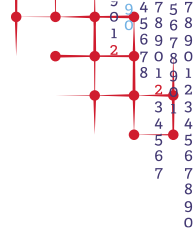

I-Smile is a statewide program that connects children and families with dental, medical, and community resources to ensure a lifetime of health and wellness. Legislators recognized the importance of early and routine dental care for Iowa's most vulnerable children and sought assurance that those children be provided with dental screenings and preventive, diagnostic, treatment, and emergency services as identifies in the oral health standards under the Early and Periodic Screening, Diagnosis and Treatment program.
