


#### Introduction

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# Iowa Specialty Hospital





- Prior to 2015 ISH had two therapists they contracted with.
  - Limited coverage
  - Limited availability
- Psychiatry
  - One psychiatrist came to Wright County 2 days per month
- Options for mental health care in 2015
  - Fort Dodge 45 minutes from Clarion
  - Ames 1 hour from Clarion
  - Mason City 1 hour from Clarion, 40 minutes from Belmond
  - Some agencies had outreach offices in Clarion with limited hours and availability.



- Wright County Stats
  - The suicide rate for Wright County was 16.4 compared to State of Iowa rate at 10.4 (suicides 2002-2006 per the 2009 Iowa Health Fact Book).
  - Underage drinking and substance abuse/domestic abuse were a high priority for those surveyed with 49% stating it was a risky behavior per the Wright County Community Needs Survey 2010.
  - Binge drinking for adults in 2008 was reported at 20% in Wright County which was the same for the State of Iowa.
  - From the HRSA Community Health Status Report 2010, it states of our 12,900 county population 740 reported major depression and 760 reported using drugs in the past month.




- Wright County Stats
  - According to the 2012 CHNA report the community does have concerns regarding access to mental health care and number of poor mental health days per month average. The Wright County Survey indicated that 35% of residents are stressed, depressed or have problems with their emotions averaging 3-4 days per month. Wright County residents also rated Mental Health in the top three most important health problems that impact the overall community.
  - Mental Health Quality of life was the top priority in the 2016 CHNA for Wright County.




Iowa's percentage of major depressive episode (MDE) among adolescents aged 12-17 was similar to the





In Iowa, about 25,000 adolescents aged 12-17 (10.4% of all adolescents) per year in 2013-2014 had at least one MDE within the year prior to being surveyed. The percentage increased from 2010-2011 to 2013-2014.

lowa's percentage of adults aged 18 or older with suicidal thoughts was similar to the national percentage in 2013-2014.







In lowa, about 94,000 adults aged 18 or older (4.0% of all adults) per year in 2013-2014 had serious thoughts of suicide within the year prior to being surveyed. The percentage did not change significantly from 2010-2011 to 2013-2014.



lowa's annual average of treatment for depression among adolescents aged 12–17 with MDE was higher than the annual average for the nation (38.6%) from 2010 to 2014. lowa's annual average of mental health treatment/counseling among adults aged 18 or older with any mental illness (AMI) was higher than the annual average for the nation (42.7%) from 2010 to 2014.







In lowa, about 10,000 adolescents aged 12–17 with MDE (51.0% of all adolescents with MDE) per year from 2010 to 2014 received treatment for their depression within the year prior to being surveyed.



In Iowa, about 198,000 adults aged 18 or older with AMI (48.5% of all adults with AMI) per year from 2010 to 2014 received mental health treatment/counseling within the year prior to being surveyed.

- September 2021
  - Belmond Klemme Community Schools added a full time therapist
- April 2022
  - Hampton Dumont Community Schools added a full time therapist in the elementary schools. Middle school has been added now.
- August 2022
  - Eagle Grove Community Schools added a full time therapist to the district.
- September 2022
  - Charles City Community middle and high schools added
- February 2023
  - Garner Hayfield Community schools added.
  - Lake Mills Community schools added.



- What makes our school program unique?
  - ISH's dedication to completely staffing the school with a therapist.
  - No grants, funded by ISH, billed through patient's insurance, schools don't pay anything
  - Most of the therapists are at the schools full time and are a part of the schools team.
    - Clarion, Eagle Grove, Belmond
    - When they are there full time we ask that the therapist has a dedicated space they can be in and that we can bring in things to make it more comfortable (chairs, couch, toys, etc.)
