Work Requirements

- ▶ One Medicaid coverage group requires an individual to have earned income from employment or self-employment. In Iowa, this group is called Medicaid for Employed People with Disabilities (MEPD).
- ▶ For all other coverage groups under Medicaid, there is not a requirement for an individual to be employed as a condition of eligibility.
- ▶ According to SMD: 18-002 guidance, states may use of Section 1115 Waiver process to submit Medicaid work and community engagement waivers for approval.

 According to the guidance, States may not impose such requirements on individuals classified as "disabled" for Medicaid eligibility purposes.

However, a more frequent income check could be performed. For example, states could perform income verifications quarterly. States must submit a verification plan to CMS for approval.

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All adult Medicaid enrollees with the exception of the following populations:

Eligibility Criteria

This is not a coverage group for Medicaid. DWP provides services to individuals aged 19 and older, except for populations listed above.

Who is Eligible?

- ► Meets income guidelines
- ► Is a U.S. citizen or legal immigrant

Eligibility Criteria

A household may consist of one or more persons, and there is no requirement that a child be in the home. However, if living together, the following household members are mandatory to be in one SNAP household:

- Spouses
- Parents and their children aged 21 or younger
- ► Children under parental control, regardless of relation
- People who purchase and prepare food together, regardless of relation

Nonfinancial eligibility includes:

- ► Applicants and participants must be residents of lowa
- ▶ Applicants and participants must be U.S. citizens or legal immigrants
- Households must provide a social security number or proof of application for one, for any member aged seven months or older
- ► Applicants and participants must agree to register for work

Financial eligibility includes income and resource limits as explained below:

- The gross income limit is based on 130 percent of the federal poverty level (FPL).
- ► The income limits are adjusted each year on October 1.

Frequency of Eligibility Verification

- Every application,
- Completed for every household member at application and each recertification.

Most households are certified for six months.

Work Requirements

There are three categories of work requirements:

- ► Mandatory work registrants (MWRs)
- Able-bodied adults without dependents (ABAWDs)
- ► SNAP Employment and Training (E&T)

Mandatory Work Registrants:

All applicants and recipients aged 16-59 are mandatory work registrants unless they meet a federal exemption.

A person subject to MWR requirements must not voluntarily quit a job and must work at least 30 hours per week, if offered by their employer. Failure to adhere to these guidelines may result in temporary disqualification from the program.

Able-bodied adults without dependents (ABAWDs), who are MWRs between 18-49 years of age who:

- Do not have a physical or mental barrier that limits their ability to maintain employment
- ▶ Do not have a child under 18 years of age in their household
- ▶ Are not pregnant

Eligibility for ABAWDs is limited to three months in a fixed three-year period.

SNAP Employment & Training:

E&T is a voluntary program in Iowa administered through participating community colleges and community based organizations. Participating in the program may allow participants to meet or be exempt from student eligibility, MWR, and ABAWD requirements.

Federal Flexibility



Federal regulations at 7 CFR 273.2 (a) state: "The State agency cannot, as a condition of eligibility, impose additional application or application processing requirements." Therefore, other than options allowed for by regulations, we cannot impose additional requirements.

More frequent verification of eligibility: Regulations at 7 CFR 273.12 explain reporting requirements. States have the option of implementing either:

- Change reporting, with monthly or quarterly reports
- Simplified reporting, with 6-month reports

Note: Only one state does not utilize simplified reporting. Changing the reporting requirements would be made via a state plan amendment. Rules at 441—65.5(234) would need to be changed.

Family Investment Program



Common client profile:

- ► Single Caucasian woman, age 20-29
- ► Has one or more children under the age of 18 living at home
- ▶ \$134.51/month per recipient

Who is Eligible?

- Meets income and resource guidelines
- ► Is a U.S. citizen or legal immigrant
- Must have a child (under 18 or 18 and attending high school full time and expected to complete school before 19) in the home

Eligibility Criteria

A family must meet financial and nonfinancial eligibility criteria to be eligible for FIP.

Nonfinancial eligibility

- Children must live with a parent or relative
- ► Children must be under age 18 or 18 and attending and expected to complete school before age 19
- ▶ Must live in Iowa
- ▶ Must be U.S. citizens or eligible alien
- Must provide a social security number or proof of application for a number
- Must cooperate in establishing paternity and collecting child support
- Must assign their right to child support payments to the state while on FIP
- Minor parents must live with a parent or legal guardian or show proof of good cause for not doing so
- Must cooperate with PROMISE JOBS, the Department's work and training program
- Resource limits: \$2,000 for applicants and \$5,000 for participants

Federal law imposes a 60-month lifetime limit on the period that families with adults can receive TANF-funded assistance. Months of TANF assistance in any state count toward the nationwide 60-month lifetime limit. After 60 months, 6-month extensions can be approved, if the family shows proof of a hardship that prevents them from being self-supporting. Examples of hardship reasons: physical or mental health problems, substance abuse. domestic violence.

Frequency of Eligibility Verification

- ► Every application,
- ▶ Review every six months and
- ► Anytime a change is reported or known to the agency

Work Requirements

Yes. States receiving a TANF grant:

- Must verify and report hours of participation on work-eligible members of families receiving TANF assistance and
- Are required to meet specified work participation rates to avoid federal sanction

All FIP applicants and participants must cooperate with PROMISE JOBS unless exempt. The PROMISE JOBS program provides work and training services for FIP participants to meet federal requirements and to help participants become self-supporting.

Almost all of the adults in a FIP household are required to participate in PROMISE JOBS. Those who are not required to participate include:

- ► Children under 16 who are not parents
- ► Children age 16-18 who are in school
- ► Persons receiving SSI
- Caretaker relatives who do not receive FIP

FIP Eligibility

Determinations: There are no federal requirements or prohibitions regarding how frequently states do eligibility determinations for programs funded with TANF, including FIP. There would be a fiscal impact related to completing more frequent eligibility determinations (printing, postage, increase in workload). This change would require rule changes, system changes, manual changes, form changes and training.

Please note that if a policy change causes the FIP caseload to decrease the decrease in cases related to the policy change cannot be counted in the caseload reduction credit that helps the state meet federal TANF work rate requirements.



FIP Work Requirements:

Federal TANF statute and regulations would allow changes to the FIP work requirements, but only to the extent that the program continues to meet TANF work requirements as specified in federal law, Title IV of the Social Security Act. There are no waiver provisions in federal law for TANF.

Any changes would require rule changes, system changes, manual changes, form changes and training, along with potential updates to lowa code, our TANF State Plan, TANF Work Verification Plan, and contract with lowa Workforce Development (for PROMISE IOBS services).



Child Care Assistance



Common member profile:

- ► Children of income-eligible parents
- ► Aged 13 and under
- ▶ Parents depend on daytime childcare

Who is Eligible?

- ▶ Children of income-eligible parents who are absent for a portion of the day due to employment or participation in academic or vocational training or PROMISE JOBS activities.
- Assistance may also be available for a limited period of time to the children of a parent looking for employment.
- Child care services for a child with protective needs are provided without regard to income.

Eligibility Criteria

Families may get help from the Child Care Assistance program if they:

- ► Have a child who needs care who is under the age of 13 (or under the age of 19 if the child has special needs) and
- Are a member of a Family Investment Program (FIP) participant household

If the family is not a Family Investment Program participant, they may qualify for the CCA program if they:

- ► Have a child who needs care who is under the age of 13 (or under the age of 19 if the child has special needs) and
- ► Have income under the program's limits and work an average of at least 28 hours per week; or
- ► Attend an approvable training or education program full-time; or
- Attend approvable training part-time and also work part-time for a total of at least 28 hours per week; or
- ► Are looking for work; or
- Become unable to work or attend school because of an approved medical reason

NOTE: Child care provided while a parent participates in postsecondary education or training has a 24 fiscal month lifetime limit

Income limits as of July 1, 2022 are:

- ► For initial eligibility (application), family income may not exceed 145 percent of the Federal Poverty Level (FPL) for basic care, or 200 percent of the FPL for families with special needs children.
- ► For ongoing eligibility (annual review), family income may not exceed 250 percent of the Federal Poverty Level (FPL) for basic care, or 275 percent of the FPL for families with special needs children.

Frequency of Eligibility Verification

► Annually



Work Requirements

- ► Employment of at least 28 hours per week on average; or
- ► Attend an approvable training or education program fulltime (as determined by the facility); or
- Attend approvable training part-time and also work parttime for a total of at least 28 hours per week on average
